Food for thought

Your grandma almost certainly told you – again and again - that table **manners** are very important. People will **forgive** almost any evil characteristic if you know how to hold a knife correctly and don't reach across your neighbour's plate for the ketchup. But what is considered **polite** in Britain is not in other places.

A clean plate might make your mother happy, for example, but it is considered very **rude** in China, The Philippines and Thailand, as it suggests that the host has not offered you enough food. The Chinese will also happily **burp** loudly after a meal to show the cook that they are **satisfied**.
